Highest accomplishment is the creation in last years budget of the Clean Water Infrastructure Gran program. This is a program myself and my colleague Steve Otis of Rye approached Speaker Heastie with the idea of creating a state funding grant program to be paired with the EFC Loan program. We approved \$200 million in last years budget and added \$200 million this recently passed budget.

Combined with an historic increase in EPF Funding overall, we are making some positive strides as it relates to the environmental agenda overall.

In this area my primary focus has been to support the long range renewable goal which will reduce our dependency of fossil fuels as well. As one who represents low income urban neighborhoods I have also been supportive of agencies and programs that work to improve energy efficiency and lower daily operational costs to our constituents. I am also sensitive supportive of our farmers as they need to be sustainable if we are to have healthy food choices in our minority communities.

Whether it is mercury or triclosan, my voting record is consistent with the agenda of NYLCV. Additionally I work closely with Community Roots and the City of Albany and DOH on food security, community gardens and programs geared towards educating our youth on proper nutrition for healthy lifestyles.

This past budget the EPF witnessed targeted increases to move along the recycling program, to increase funding for water quality and to preserve open space. We have also increased funding for invasive species as well.

We have sponsored several bills as it relates to the transport of crude oil. It needs to be done safely especially in our environmental justice areas many of whom I represent. I have and continue to support projects like the Watervliet organic digester as we hope to make it a model for all communities. I also supported more bike and pedestrian programs and funding to encourage less care use and a more healthier lifestyle.
