ISSUES

Each year, NYLCV works closely with New York's leading environmental, public health, conservation, energy, environmental justice, and transportation organizations to identify the most pressing priorities on fighting climate change, conserving land and water, and protecting public health. These issues drive NYLCV's advocacy work throughout the legislative session, influence the bills we select for NYLCV's Environmental Scorecards, and informs the decision on the candidates we choose to endorse. Combating Climate Change

The time to act on climate is now. We must make radical changes in short order to avoid catastrophic climate change. New York's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act will require action at all levels of government to achieve its ambitious goal of reducing economy wide emissions 85% by 2050 and achieving 70% renewable energy by 2030. By allocating resources wisely, local governments can have a significant impact on energy use and the environment. Localities must also adapt to a changing climate and include resiliency planning in all aspects of future governance.

2. Energy (p. 5)

As a Huntington Town Councilman, we've put a focus on promoting renewable energy initiatives aimed at both reducing our reliance on fossil fuels while also saving taxpayer dollars. One of the initiatives that I'm most proud of is the plan for a microgrid to power the Dix Hills Ice Rink, Town Hall, Huntington Hospital and other nearby buildings more reliably. We've also expedited all permits for residents that want to put solar panels on their homes.

I was sponsored a resolution to hire a Chief Sustainability Officer and this decision has paid handsome dividends for the town in energy savings and grants received.

I agree that we need to be investing more in mass transit like the LIRR and Suffolk Buses.

4. Resiliency (p. 6 - 7)

Living on an island, coastal resiliency is of the most utmost importance. I strongly agree with all of the policy outlined in the Long Island Chapter Policy Agenda and look forward to working with NYLCV to accomplish these goals.

5. Solid Waste (p. 7)

More needs to be done and I look forward to working to promote the reduction of solid waste as a legislator. I'm happy that here in Suffolk County, the legislature has banned single-use plastic straws, placed a 5-cent fee on bags and NYS banned the use of plastic bags. At the Town of Huntington, while some of the neighboring towns stopped curbside collection of glass, we were able to continue glass collection.

Protecting People and Natural Resources

All New Yorkers deserve indoor and outdoor environments that are free of contamination and pollution.

6. Clean Water (p. 8 - 9)

Nitrogen pollution from cesspools and septic systems is a huge issue here in Suffolk County. I've worked to encourage Huntington homeowners to apply for grants to help with the purchase and installation of Innovative and Alternative Onsite Wastewater Treatment Systems. We've also done studies on expanding the Southwest Sewer District into Huntington Station, an effort that would clean our water and boost revitalization projects

7. Sustainable Development (p. 9)

In the Town of Huntington, we've worked to keep the revitalization of our town consistent with smart growth, promote walkability and public transit, and encourage businesses to utilize green roofing like we are doing on public buildings. As a Legislator, I will continue to promote sustainable development.



8. Parks and Open Spaces (p.11)

As a Councilman, I have a long record of preserving open space. The Environmental Open Space and Park Improvement Bond Acts, enabled the Town to purchase over 240 acres of parkland including Manor Farm, Northport Knolls, Veterans Park, Mohlenhoff property, the John Coltrane Park and 20 acres at Hobart Beach. The referendum funding has also assisted in the renovations and equipment upgrades to parks throughout Huntington.

9. Farms and Local Food (p. 11)

I believe that there needs to be more investments in local farms and food by our government and agree with all of the ideas and agenda items in the LI Policy Agenda.
