




The Suffolk County Water Quality Restoration Act – which empowers county residents to address a decades-long water crisis – was one of the bright spots of the 2024 Legislative Session.



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Foreward:

As we mark five years since the passage of the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA), the urgency of our mission has never been clearer. We are experiencing shorter and warmer winters, scorching summer heat that shatters records day after day, more frequent – and more devastating – storms and wildfires, and more active hurricane seasons.

These are not just warnings—they are sirens blaring, telling us that our state, our nation, and our world are in the midst of a climate crisis that demands immediate and decisive action.

Against this backdrop, it is particularly troubling that the final days of the 2024 legislative session descended into a battle over congestion pricing after Governor Hochul placed an indefinite pause on the program just weeks before its scheduled implementation. The time and political capital that legislators could've spent on taking new and necessary climate action were instead spent defending a measure that was passed years ago, studied extensively, and approved by the federal government.

Let me be clear: we remain resolute in our commitment to seeing congestion pricing through, and we commend the courage of our state representatives who stood firm against this misguided delay.



Despite the chaotic closing days, the 2024 legislative session did produce some important climate victories.

There is no clean energy transition without transmission and that is why one of the brightest notes of the session was adoption of the RAPID Act as part of the FY25 budget. This measure will help ensure we have the capacity to deliver clean wind, solar, and hydro power to homes and businesses across the state.

The passage of the Suffolk County Water Restoration Act, the expansion of the Food Donation and Scraps Program, the Electric Vehicle Charging in Public Lots bill, and the NY Wildlife Crossing Act were also significant victories. And the NYC Green Roof Tax Abatement is a promising step towards creating more sustainable urban environments.

The Clean Water Infrastructure Act's continued funding at \$500 million and the protection of the Environmental Protection Fund from budgetary raids are positive developments. However, we must increase these investments in the coming years to address flood mitigation, replace lead service lines, tackle emerging contaminants like PFAS, and remove lead from school drinking water.

While we are encouraged by the Senate's continued leadership, passing crucial bills like the Clean Fuel Standard for transportation, NY HEAT, the Just Energy Transition Act, and the Packaging Reduction & Recycling Infrastructure Act, it is deeply disappointing that the Assembly once again failed to act on these critical pieces of legislation.

This legislative paralysis in the Assembly must end if we are to meet our climate goals and protect future generations.

Looking ahead, we need to accelerate our efforts to bolster key pillars of the clean energy transition, including the expansion of utility-scale Battery Energy Storage Systems, which will ensure our grid is as reliable as it is robust.

Our buildings and transportation sectors remain significant sources of emissions, and if we are serious about implementing the CLCPA and maintaining our climate leadership, we must pass legislation that addresses these areas head-on.

As we approach the halfway mark to our 2030 emission reduction goals, we must move beyond planning and into action. We urge New Yorkers to use this scorecard as a tool to measure the actions—or inactions—of their representatives on environmental issues. By doing so, we can hold our legislators accountable and make sure New York remains a leader in the fight against climate change.

New York State Budget Victories:

Although we do not assign a score to the state budget, it is through that process in the early months of the session where some of the most consequential climate action is debated and voted on, including annual funding for the Environmental Protection Fund and the Clean Water Infrastructure Act, plus a host of other measures that require direct budgetary action. This year, that included the passage of the RAPID Act, which will help expand the state's clean-energy transmission capacity to keep up with demand. And while this budget delivered a partial victory by making battery energy storage less costly for home systems, it missed the opportunity to provide tax breaks for utility-scale battery storage systems that are critically needed to ensure our clean energy grid is as reliable as it is robust.

NYLCV-SUPPORT BUDGET MEASURES INCLUDED:

- \$400M for the Environmental Protection Fund, without raiding the fund to pay for agency staff;
- \$500 million for the Clean Water Infrastructure Act;
- **RAPID Act** to expand clean-energy transmission capacity;
- Sammy's Law, which allows NYC to lower speed limit to 20 mph on certain streets;
- Authorization for the MTA to waive penalties for fare evasion if the offender instead enrolls in the **Fair Fares program**;
- **Stronger enforcement of illegal license plate covers** to help ensure effective implementation of the congestion pricing program in New York City;
- A needs evaluation for highway and depot electric vehicle charging infrastructure;
- Clarification that **Bond Act** grant funding for electric school buses will not impact a school district's transportation aid; and
- The creation of a Zero-Emission School Bus Resource Center within NYSERDA.

We applaud Governor Hochul, Majority Leader Stewart-Cousins, Speaker Heastie, Environmental Conservation Committee Chairs Senator Peter Harckham and Assemblymember Deborah Glick, and Energy Committee Chairs Senator Kevin Parker and Assemblymember Didi Barrett for including these important policies in this year's budget.

About the Bills

CLEAN FUEL STANDARD

A. 964-B/S. 1292-A

This legislation would create a clean fuel standard to reduce carbon intensity of on-road transportation fuels by at least 20% by 2032 and make further reductions in line with CLCPA goals after 2032. This policy would incentivize fleets and fuel providers to move away from carbonintensive fuels like diesel and gasoline toward low- or zero-carbon fuels like electric, biofuels, and hydrogen. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Carrie Woerner and Senator Kevin Parker*, A. 964-B/S. 1292-A passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Environmental Conservation.



NY HEAT

A. 4592-B/S. 2016-B

This legislation would amend the public service law, the public authorities law, the transportation corporations law, and the labor law in relation to aligning utility regulation with state climate justice and emission reduction targets; to repeal section 66-b of the public service law relating to continuation of gas service; and to repeal section 66-g of the public service law relating to the sale of indigenous natural gas for generation of electricity. Sponsored by Assemblymember Pat Fahy and Senator Liz Krueger, A. 4592-B/S. 2016-B passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Corporations, Authorities, and Commissions.

COMPLETE STREETS

A. 1280-A/S. 9718

This policy amends the highway law, in relation to enabling safe access to public roads for all users by utilizing complete street design principles. Sponsored by Assemblymember Jonathan Rivera and Senator Sean Ryan, A. 1280-A/S. 9718 passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Rules.



SUFFOLK COUNTY WATER QUALITY RESTORATION ACT

A. 8993/S. 8473

The Suffolk County Water Quality Restoration Act will allow the voters of Suffolk County to create a water quality restoration fund to finance projects for the protection, preservation, and rehabilitation of groundwater and surface waters as recommended by the Suffolk County Subwatersheds Wastewater Plan (SWP). Sponsored by Assemblymember Fred Thiele and Senator Monica Martinez, A. 8993/S. 8473 passed in both houses and was signed into law by Governor Hochul on May 23, 2024.

PACKAGING REDUCTION RECYCLING INFRASTRUCTURE ACT

A. 5322-D/S. 4246-D

This legislation would require producers of packaging waste to take financial responsibility for the recycling of their products, either by funding existing municipal recycling or by creating new systems. The Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act would shift the burden of recycling products back to the producer, similar to product stewardship programs that are already in use in New York for electronic waste, paint, pharmaceutical drugs, and carpets. Successful waste reduction programs create financial incentives for producers to minimize the amount of waste they produce in the first place and use more readily recyclable materials in production. Sponsored by Assemblymember Deborah Glick and Senator Pete Harckham, A. 5322-D/S. 4246-D passed in the Senate and died on the Assembly floor.

NYC GREEN ROOF TAX ABATEMENT

A. 6901-A/S. 6409-A

This legislation reauthorizes New York City's property tax credit for green roofs and removes some barriers to make the program more accessible. Sponsored by Assemblymember Nily Rozic and Senator John Liu, A. 6901-A/S. 6409-A passed both houses unanimously and was signed into law by Governor Hochul on June 28, 2024.

EV CHARGING IN PUBLIC LOTS

A. 4871-B/S. 1535-B

This bill will require all New York State-owned or operated parking garages, open parking lots and other parking facilities to install and maintain a set amount of charging stations for plug-in electric vehicles (EVs). Sponsored by Assemblymember Anna Kelles and Senator Brad Hoylman-Sigal, A. 4871-B/S. 1535-B passed in both houses and is awaiting action by Governor Hochul.

RECHARGEABLE BATTERY RECYCLING LAW

A. 7339-C/S. 643-E

This legislation would amend the current battery recycling law to include the specific types of lithium-ion rechargeable batteries used in e-bikes and e-scooters. The bill will also amend New York State's Environmental Conservation Law to allow the City of New York to enforce provisions of the rechargeable battery law. Sponsored by Assemblymember Deborah Glick and Senator Brian Kavanagh, A. 7339-C/S. 643-E passed in the Senate unanimously and died on the Assembly floor.

JUST ENERGY TRANSITION ACT

A. 4866-D/S. 2935-C

The Just Energy Transition Act, would direct the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) to develop a study of competitive options for phasing out and redeveloping New York State's most-polluting fossil fuel facilities by 2030 while still ensuring resource adequacy and grid reliability. It would further direct the Department of Public Service (DPS) and the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to develop initiatives to advance the recommendations made by this study. Sponsored by Assemblymember Anna Kelles and Senator Kevin Parker, A. 4866-D/S. 2935-C (not same-as) passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Ways and Means.

PFAS IN MENSTRUAL CARE PRODUCTS

A. 5990-C/S. 3529-C

This legislation would prohibit the use of unsafe substances including PFAS chemicals in menstrual products and authorize the Department of Health to promulgate regulations to prohibit the use of further substances that it determines to be unsafe in menstrual products. Sponsored by Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal and Senator Nathalia Fernandez, A. 5990-A/S. 3529-A passed unanimously in the Senate and died on the Assembly floor.



RIDE CLEAN REBATE

A. 275-A/S. 314-A

This legislation would direct NYSERDA to create a Ride Clean Rebate Program to allow class one, class two, and class three bicycles with electric assists and electric scooters to be eligible for a 50% purchase rebate up to \$1,100. Sponsored by Assemblymember Robert Carroll and Senate Julia Salazar, A. 275-A/S. 314-A passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Ways and Means.

EXPANSION OF THE FOOD DONATION AND SCRAPS PROGRAM

A. 5906-A/S. 5331-A

This bill will expand the food donation and food scraps recycling law to include waste from producers of 2 tons or more of food scraps per week to producers of 1 ton or more per week beginning January 1, 2025 and producers of one-half ton or more per week starting Jan 1, 2027. Sponsored by Assemblymember MaryJane Shmisky and Senator Pete Harckham, A. 5906-A/S. 5331-A passed both houses and is awaiting action by Governor Hochul.

NY WILDLIFE CROSSING ACT

A. 4243-B/S. 4198-B

This legislation would direct the department of transportation to identify sites along all highways, thruways, and parkways in the state where wildlife crossings are most needed to increase public safety and improve habitat connectivity; and to create a priority list of wildlife crossing opportunity areas where federal grant monies may be available to implement the top five projects identified. Sponsored by Assemblymember Robert Carroll and Senator Leroy Comrie, A. 4243-B/S. 4198-B passed in both houses and is awaiting action by Governor Hochul.

Methodology & Key Results

Bills that passed their respective houses of the legislature were graded on whether or not each legislator took the pro-environment vote. An unexcused missed vote is counted the same as an anti-environmental vote, though we did not count excused absences against the final score. Scored bills that did not reach a floor vote were graded on co-sponsorship. Annual scores are based on a scale of 0 to 100 and calculated by dividing the number of pro-environmental votes or bill sponsorships by the total number of bills each member was scored on. This year, we are grading 13 bills in both the State Senate and the Assembly. Legislative leaders were not graded, although the scores of their conferences, which they have a substantial impact on, are listed.




